
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
## **GREETINGS HOMESCHOOLING PARENTS,**


As my students study genetics and trait inheritance in my Biology class, many of them become interested in their own family lineage. It can become quite enthralling for them as they look at the names of their ancestors, where and when they lived, etc. One mom told me that her daughter really got into it - studying the towns and locations where her great grandparents lived. They even drove to see the house where her great grandmother grew up. You can have your children research information on the towns of their ancestors - name and location of town, latitude and longitude, climate, culture, history, and maybe even the house they lived in. Some families have even driven to visit those towns. So many possibilities!

At the bottom of this page is a pullout example of part of a filled-in ancestry wheel. You would typically enter name, date and place of birth, and if deceased, date and place of death. Scroll down for a 34 inch diameter ancestry wheel that you can have printed at a print shop such as FedEx Office or at office supply stores. It goes through 6th great grandparents. Or, scroll down for smaller color and black and white ancestry wheels that you can print at home on 8.5 x 11 paper. It goes through 2nd great grandparents. Have fun and please feel free to share with other families.
